





As deputy general counsel, David Chavern is responsible for the day-to-day management of Ex-Im Bank's 25-lawyer General Counsel's Office. Chavern provides advice to senior political management on a wide variety of matters, including financing structures, governance, statutory and regulatory obligations, new product development, Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) and World Trade Organization (WTO) requirements, and other policy issues.



Chavern assumed his current post in July 2002. Before that he established and served as vice president of Ex-Im Bank's International Business Relations Division, and before that was vice president of group operations with responsibility for the Bank's Credit Review and Compliance unit. From July 1998 to April 1999, he was detailed as a senior advisor to the Bank's Structured and Trade Finance group. Chavern joined Ex-Im Bank in 1992 as senior counsel in the General Counsel's Office, where his areas of focus included India, Pakistan, Russia and Africa; project and structured finance; and "bad actor" issues.

From 1987 to 1992, Chavern was an associate with the law firm of Buchanan Ingersoll in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. During the summer of 1985, he was an intern in the American Consulate in Karachi, Pakistan, where he compiled a report on the state of squatter settlements in Karachi.

Chavern was the recipient of the 2001 Chairman's Award, the highest honor offered by Ex-Im Bank. During 1995-96, he was a fellow at the Council for Excellence in Government.

Chavern holds a master's degree in business administration from Georgetown University, where he graduated first in a class of 51. He holds a Juris Doctor, cum laude, from Villanova University, and a Bachelor of Arts degree, magna cum laude, from the University of Pittsburgh.
